Dear Dr. Shuster,


Apologies of losing your January letter in my letter basket while having a siege of colds! It has been a long time since our trails crossed at Mt. Lake! Like yourself, I have been doing other things than "playing" with Limulus the past few years,- mainly echinodermal work.

I did not know of Barthel's work on Solnhofen Spüren. Last use made of my "pioneer" work on Solnhofen trails was a study at Senckenberg about ten years ago when a more or less popular brochure was prepared on the matter, with very fine illustration.

Your list is essentially complete on my work in the field. You might want to add a pertinent bunodomorph study done by Harold Brooks and me: New fossils from the Canadian-Chazyan (Ordovician hiatus in Tennessee: Bull. American Paleont., vol. 36 (No.157), pp. 157-197, pls. 12-21. I dare say Eurypterid studies are too far off beat for your listing. I and Kjellesvig-Waering had several of these over the years.

I hope your dream of the Limulus monograph is fulfilled. I would like to read it.

Dear Dr. Caster:

It has been some time since I have been actively engaged in research, but I have been able to keep in touch with studies on Limulus through the work of others.

As you probably know, Professor K. Werner Barthel, of the Institute of Geology and Paleontology, Berlin, is expanding upon your pioneer studies on the tracks in Solnhofen lithographic limestone. We have been in correspondence regarding the natural history and behavior of Limulus. This sent me to my files and note I have six references to your papers; with reprints of those marked with a red asterisk.

Some day I hope to prepare a monograph on the limulids, at least to the extent of publishing an annotated bibliography. If, therefore, my records on your work on limulids are uncomplete, I would appreciate updated information and/or reprints.

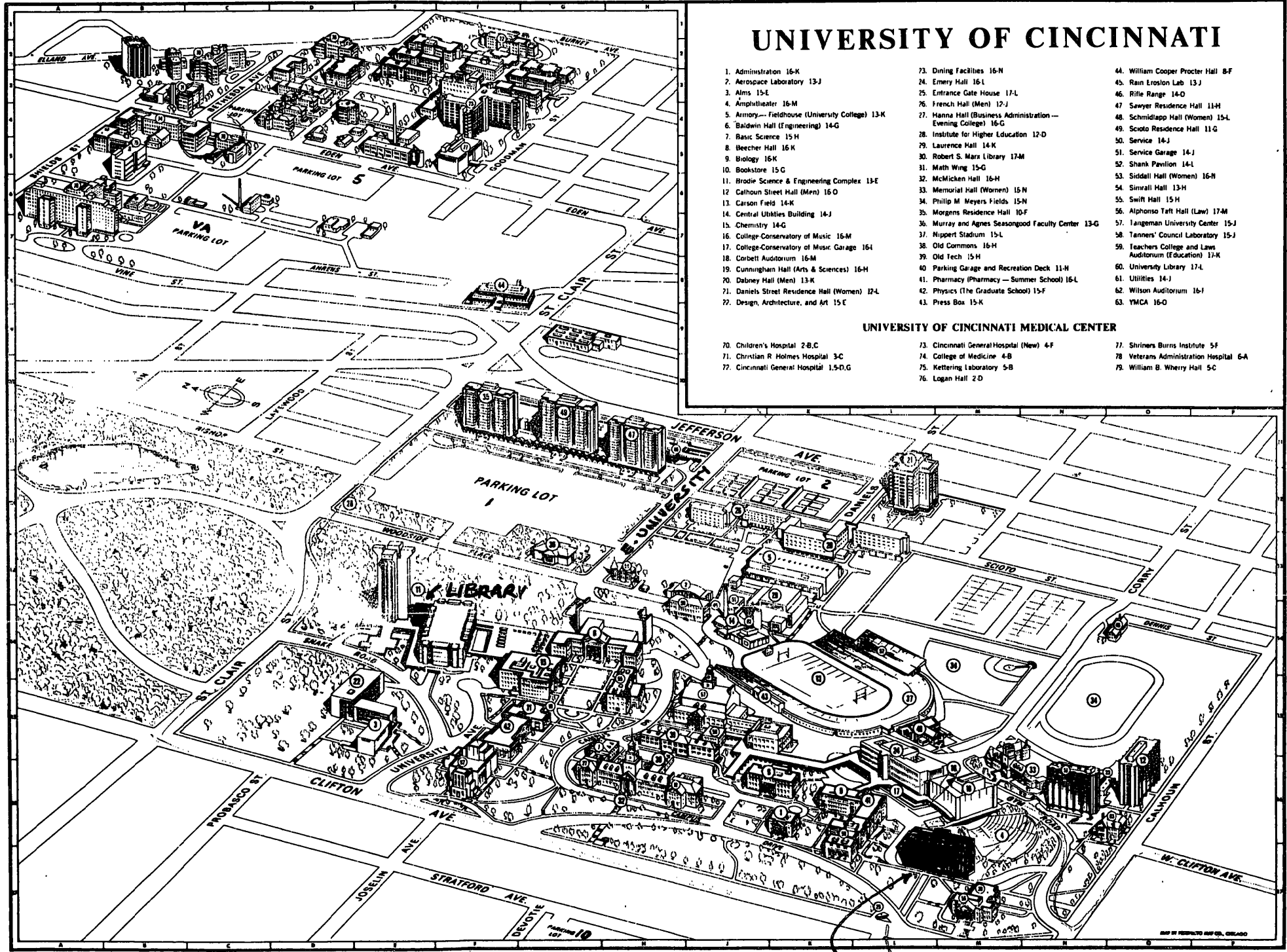
